

#### THE SPIRITUALITY OF BEING OUTDOORS

As the Chasidic Rebbe, Rabbi Nachman of Bratzlav, taught hundreds of years ago, there is something uniquely spiritual about being outdoors. Our sages even remind us that every synagogue is required to have at least one window so that we can look out into the world that surrounds us. This window prevents us from being blind to the world of nature and to the world that exists outside the synagogue walls. What better way to fulfill this commandment than by opening our doors and heading outside?

That's why this summer, we are trying something new! Yes, Bolton Street Synagogue has had our services outside in the Meadow, both at Rosh Hashanah and at Shabbat, for many years. Yet, this summer it will be different! We will join together in our Meadow every Friday evening during the months of July and August. With sunset times, our summer services will change slightly. We will begin services at 6:30 PM each and every Friday in July and August. This will, of course, be weather permitting. We want to make sure that everyone is comfortable and safe. Our hope is that the weather will hold up and we can join together in the Meadow for many of the services this summer.

Personally, I love praying outdoors. I find myself closer to the Holy One when I watch the sun set in the distance, hear the birds chirp, and feel the wind upon my shoulders. There is something uniquely spiritual that can't be found in any indoor building, even our beautiful

sanctuary. Plus, there is an informality about being outside. Please wear sundresses or shorts, flip flops and sandals! Come as you are and bring your friends. Kids and adults welcome! As the Rebbe teaches, may we frolic outside with the trees, the animals, and with each other. May we enter into prayer and gain something greater than ourselves.

# THE YEAR IN REVIEW

Bolton Street Synagogue was founded in 1986, meaning we have been around for 32 years. In Judaism, 32 is the number of organizing principles of the universe, also known as the wondrous ways of wisdom. So, 32 years in, how wise are we? We're still open to learning and growing and changing, and that shows some great wisdom. As Pirkei Avot tells us "Who is wise? The one who learns from everyone." I want to emphasize the "everyone" part of that quote. Bolton Street is a community where everyone matters and where everyone can play a role. As I summarize the activities and accomplishments of this year, I hope you will see that.

In some ways this past year has been about the same things that have been essential to our identity from the start: community and connection, social justice, learning, and spirituality. But it has also been about exploring how we live those values in 2018 so that we can continue to stay current and move forward.

As a congregation, services are the center of our community, and throughout the year attendance at services has been up. An average Friday evening now brings 35-40 members plus some visitors. Rabbi Gordon has brought new musicians to our services, new tunes, and new warmth. We recently participated in the second annual URJ Shabbat where our attendance was the highest percentage of any congregation there. We instituted an early first Friday service. Our Tot shabbats have been well attended and have attracted families who are now considering our religious school. We began a summer series of Tot Shabbats in the park across the street. And beginning July 6, all our summer services will be outside.

Holiday services and celebrations this year have also included a mix of old and new. We had a drumming circle and honey cake contest for S'lichot, an adult Purim shpiel with lots of laughs and Persian cocktails, too, a Shavuot study and cheesecake contest, our annual Chanukah

dinner, a Tu b'shevat seder, and a second night Passover Seder with record-setting attendance, as well as an LGBTQ Seder co-sponsored with JQBaltimore. But one of the best holiday developments this year happened in the Fall when cantorial student Emily Simkin came for the High Holy days. We were all entranced by her beautiful voice and her lovely demeanor, and so we are absolutely thrilled that, with the help of several donors, we have been able to arrange for her to spend one weekend each month with us during the 2018-19 year. I'm certain many of us will be attending more services just to hear her sing.

This June marked the one-year anniversary of Jillian Manko's time with us as education director. Jillian's creativity and energy have infused all aspects of our school program. She built a new structure to the day so the students begin and end the morning in prayer together. She gives each class a theme that shapes their work. She instituted a new Sunday morning tot program that has brought new families in our doors. While Jillian and the teachers engage our students, Kehillah leaders Judy Bass and Jacqueline Bershad led monthly discussions for parents and supported Jillian's programs. Outside of school time our families participated in shabbat services, potlucks, and for the third time in recent years attended a Shabbaton at Capital Retreat Center.

Throughout the year our members have come together for engagement activities. Last summer, the rabbinic transition committee, led by Sharon Krevor-Weisbaum, hosted a series of dinners and brunches so we could introduce ourselves to Andy. In the fall, our Membership Engagement committee, chaired by Joy Mandel and Lissa Abrams, launched their year with a new member brunch at Joy's house. In January, they held our first paint night and in February we honored Shir Chadash at our Volunteer Appreciation Shabbat.

Tikkun Olam is central to our identity and we have been especially active in that regard. A year ago, under the leadership of David Conn and Salem Reiner, our Social Action Committee presented several issues to our members and we voted to focus our efforts on education. We then picked three sub-issues. For fixing the funding gap, we partnered with Strong Schools Maryland and formed what they call a Group of Ten. Karen Brown is our Group of Ten leader. She organizes our monthly meetings where we learn about education reform and write letters to government officials.

#### FROM THE PRESIDENT, CONT'D

To address early childhood education, Jeanette Karpay and Debra Brown Felser are working to develop a relationship between Bolton Street and Margaret Brent Elementary School. And for the third topic, underserved populations, Peter Berns, Doug Carrey-Beaver and Ethel Zelenske have spent many hours creating a pilot project for an IEP support program for families. In December, we hosted a forum where we could learn from legislators about education reform.

We have also continued to support other issues by partnering with other congregations and organizations. We recently co-sponsored a Refugee and Immigrant Awareness Forum and a forum on Solitary Confinement in Maryland prisons. We co-sponsored and hosted a Pride Interfaith service. We are also working with both BUILD and Jews United for Justice to enhance our advocacy impact. We continue our casserole program, which this year has been organized by Bob Brown, and has increased from 13 in October to a high of 28 in April. Our youth have also been active in social action with our annual gift drive, Good Deeds Day, and for the first time we sent a delegation of teens to the L'Taken conference in DC where they learned about social issues and lobbied our representatives.

In addition to all the programs and activities, we've had the opportunity to make great improvements to our building and grounds this year. We received a large FEMA grant which enabled us to put in over \$40,000 in security and building improvements. Our Building and Grounds Committee, led by Gary Felser, developed a building assessment so we can anticipate upcoming repairs. That works is beginning, thanks to generous donations, with the installation of new carpeting this month and new paint in the sanctuary later this summer. Outdoors, we are making improvements to the grounds, led by Paul Levine and Abe Wasserberger. A new garden by the front door is underway as are plans for a new look by Cold Spring Lane including new lighting, an updated sign, and new plantings.

And if all that isn't enough, we have also been doing big picture thinking about who we are and how to present ourselves. Our board began thinking about this last summer during our board retreat. Guided by a facilitator from URJ, we did exercises to help us envision our future and set priorities for achieving that vision. We continued our thinking in the Fall, by taking a close look at our

purpose so we could develop new mission, vision, and values statements. A mission statement is a guide for all the work we do and keeps us focused on why we exist. As the proverb says, "without vision, the people perish." I shared our new statements with you in Chaverim a few months ago.

The new mission statement was the beginning of an overall look at how we present ourselves to the larger community and to prospective members. We can also call that marketing. Elaine Richman has led our marketing efforts this year. We now have a process for posting our events on community calendars, we have increased our Facebook presence, we advertised on WYPR for the start of school and the High Holidays, we have just begun placing ads in Baltimore's Child and the Jewish Times and are in discussions with JMore about ads there as well. We also had a booth at a recent JCC block party and are looking for more fairs and events where we can have a presence.

A big marketing project of this year has been refreshing our logo. The logo was officially unveiled at our Annual Meeting. We will use this logo on all our materials, including stationary, newsletters, emails, posters, business cards, and anywhere else a logo might go.

In addition to all of the activities and programs already mentioned, our fundraising this year — under the guidance of Nancy Savage - was exceptional. The generosity of all of our members gives our congregation both stability and vitality, as evidenced by the numbers in Nancy Hutton's financial reports.

Before I conclude, one other person must be acknowledged. Every piece of our work, in some way, requires administrative support and for that we turn to Hope Ratner, our administrator. She is the key to keeping all these programs, activities, and improvements moving forward.

As you can tell, much has been accomplished in this year, but much remains to be done. As Pirkei Avot tells us, "The day is short, the task is great..."

### CREATING A JEWISH HOME

Creating the perfect house is difficult. I know because I recently moved. It takes a lot of physical work from picking paint colors to deciding where the plates go, to where to hang family pictures. Everything shifted for me during the first week of unpacking when I realized I am not expected to create a perfect house, I am expected to create a safe home. Once my point of view shifted, I turned to Judaism to help with all aspects of my move. I didn't want to just decorate a house, I wanted to create a Jewish home.

Home is our foundation. Home is where we can act out comfortably and safely without judgment from the world. It is where we wake up in the beginning of the day to get ready for whatever comes our way and it is where we belong at night. Creating a Jewish home is where we do all those things plus hang our *mezuzah*, sing *Shema* each morning and before bed at night, and where we are free to discuss everything from our daily interactions to politics without being judged. It is where we find solutions to life's difficult questions in a way that is compatible with our Jewish values. It is learning from and teaching each other how we want to be treated, and it is standing up for and supporting each other when needed.

Once I realized home is where we model our behavior for our children so they can learn from us to live Jewishly, and where we give them the tools to one day create their own Jewish home, compatible with their Jewish values, the pressure was lifted, and I felt like I could finally breathe.

Throughout my life, I have always looked to the synagogue as the home of Judaism. The synagogue is where we celebrate our simchas, engage in Jewish learning, observe Shabbat and High Holidays, and where all are welcome, no matter what is going on outside of the synagogue walls. In a time where people all over the world are looking for a home – physically, emotionally, spiritually, for community, for safety, or whatever it may

be – the synagogue is where we put our Jewish values to work.

The synagogue is where we practice our traditions and values, and the Religious School is where we teach the values that help us create a Jewish home. Just as it is my goal to create a safe Jewish environment and home for my girls to feel free to learn about themselves, what is important to them, and what kind of Jewish lives they want to lead, it is my goal for the students in our Religious School here to find their way using Judaism to guide them.

I am excited to start the next Religious School year with all of the families in our building and to teach our students about Jewish values, the importance of the synagogue, and how to create a Jewish home, but most importantly to assure them that we are here for them throughout their lives. Bolton Street Synagogue is place they can always call "home." See you in September!
