

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Rededicating Ourselves to the Future

Often, when we think about Hanukkah, we reflect upon the menorah and the miracle of lights. We even call this holiday, the Festival of Lights! Yet, Hanukkah literally means “rededication.” Hanukkah is a moment to rededicate our lives to Judaism.

Long ago, the Maccabees fought valiantly against the Syrian Greek Army and finally prevailed just as winter was approaching. They arrived in Jerusalem, cleaning and cleansing the Temple to make it holy once again. The Maccabees missed celebrating their favorite holiday of Sukkot and were unable to gather in Jerusalem that year to celebrate the eight-day festival. Instead, they remarked in the Book of Maccabees, “The Festival of Sukkot was celebrated in the month of Kislev instead of the month of Tishrei.” They just moved their celebration of Sukkot from the fall into the winter because that was when the opportunity became available.

That initial Hanukkah was a moment to rededicate the Temple and to celebrate the holiday of Sukkot in a new, even more profound way. In rededicating the Temple, the Maccabees took what was old, Sukkot, and made it new, Hanukkah.

Over these next few weeks, Bolton Street Synagogue will also be building upon our past and making it new, through two very special dedication ceremonies. You may have noticed some beautiful changes to our building during recent weeks! This past summer, we refurbished our synagogue and our beautiful sanctuary. New carpet in the Social Hall, Sanctuary, and Lobby! New paint throughout the sanctuary and on the lobby ceiling. Gifts from a few generous donors, along with the support of our building and ground committee, helped make our building feel sparkling new.

Please join us on Friday, November 16th, at 7:30pm for a rededication of our sanctuary. During our Shabbat service, we will unveil our new digs and thank those who supported us along this journey.

But, that’s not all! You’ve also seen our beautiful new grounds. We have new plants and flowers around the building. We have a brand new sign, a refurbished parking lot, and a striking commemorative garden. The garden will be a space to reflect, celebrate a simcha, and gather with friends. Bricks are being sold to commemorate a simcha or to remember a loved one. More information to purchase a brick can be found in this month’s Chaverim.

Please join us on Sunday, December 16th, at 10am as we unveil the first round of bricks in our new commemorative garden along with a short service and celebration.

As Hanukkah approaches, we often think about the miracle of light! We’ll light our Chanukkiyah and watch the flames flicker. May we also reflect upon the Maccabees who rededicated their lives to Judaism long ago. They transformed the Judaism they knew into a profound celebration that continues to be a significant part of our lives today. May we too, rededicate our lives to Judaism and to our Bolton Street Synagogue community. May we continue to remember our past. May we dedicate ourselves to the present. May we reflect upon our vision for the future. A very Happy Hanukkah to us all!

Melissa Zieve invites Guest Columnist Joy Mandel

In October, we honored Joy Mandel at our annual volunteer appreciation Shabbat. When she spoke that evening, she described her path to becoming actively involved at Bolton Street and what has motivated her to stay involved. Among her many contributions and roles at Bolton Street, Joy is one of our past-presidents, so I thought it appropriate to share her words here in the president's column. I hope you are inspired by her history of engagement!

I have been thinking about why we volunteer and what meaning it has for us. For me it has been a voyage of discovery. It started many years ago when I felt something was missing in my life and realized it was a Jewish community. Around that time Tim and I decided to raise the boys as Jews. We enrolled in a program at Oheb for interfaith families. During one of our discussions, the rabbi asked, "What are you looking for?" A very good question - there were a variety of answers. When it was my turn, I said I was looking for a Jewish community that was like the churches you hear about that when one of their members is sick, everyone brings them food and supports them in whatever ways they can. We found that community when we walked into a BSS open house 20 years ago. The first person I met there was Karen Brown. She introduced us to the Rabbi Mona Decker. Within five minutes I knew we had found the right place.

That started my volunteer journey through Bolton Street Synagogue. I have learned that the more you put into something the more you get back. I learned a lot being president. The most important lesson was to surround myself with people who had more experience and were smarter than me. And our community is full of those people. And they were more than willing to step up and help me.

Volunteering here has also helped me to clarify my purpose in life - that sounds like a revelation, but it has come to me slowly. As you well know, one of Judaism's primary pillars is tikkun olam, repairing the world. I know I am not the sort of person who is going to run for political office or make grand changes in the world via business or technology. My comfort zone is dealing with people on a much smaller scale. If I can make someone's life easier by bringing them a meal when they are just out of the hospital, that is what I will do. If I can greet a new visitor to Bolton Street and make them feel welcome, I will do that. Tim

says I try to repair the world one meal at a time. That is my way of fulfilling the commandment of tikkun olam.

None of my volunteering would be possible without the love and support of my beloved date for life, Tim. Tim also volunteers his time and efforts to BSS, in ways different from me, but equally as committed and valuable. When I was president Ben and Max were young teens. One night, Tim and I were getting ready to go to services when Max said to him, "Why are you going to services? You don't have to go. You're Catholic." And Tim said to him, "Your mother is president of the synagogue and I am going to do everything I can to make sure she has a successful presidency." I thought that was the most loving and supportive response he could have given. And what an example to set for our sons - we support each other in everything we do.

One more thing I heard at Bolton Street has had an impact on our lives. Many things have actually, but this one stands out. At a service, Jeannette Karpay talked about one of her relatives not wanting to use the good china because they were saving it for a special occasion. When does that special occasion happen? If not now, when? Think about that. When do you get involved? What are you waiting for?

You all have heard me say many times that the primary reason I am at Bolton Street is because of the community. That's true. This community is what it is because of the volunteer efforts of many people. We all contribute in ways great and small. That is who we are and part of what makes us special. I hope to be volunteering here as long as my decrepit knees will allow me to do so.



SHALOM FAMILIES!

In the Torah Portion Lech Lecha, we discover the meaning of “going forth to yourself” and learn about Abraham living a fulfilled life by following his heart and soul. In Religious School, we tell each student that we are here to support and guide them through their Jewish Journey. We teach them, just like Abraham, to follow and listen to their hearts and souls. We explain to them that each person has great potential, and it is our (the school’s, the teachers’, the families’) responsibility to teach them to use the tools (the Torah, the 613 mitzvot, and, of course, Jewish values) that will enable them to reach their full potential. As students navigate their days, enhance and develop their unique skills, and stay true to themselves, we teach them to turn to these “guide books” and learn to go forth to themselves.

What I find most remarkable about teaching students to listen to their hearts and helping them to discover their true selves is how confident students feel in the way they incorporate Judaism into their lives. Students want to discuss with their classmates “their way,” but they understand that Judaism isn’t about “right” vs. “wrong” it is about “how.” How can we use the Torah to boost our unique skill sets? How can we use Jewish values to work together and create a better world?

This year’s school journey has been off to a great start. Our students have been introduced to cantorial student Emily Simkin and our Israeli shinshin, Bar. We have welcomed a lot of new faces, refamiliarized ourselves with many returning faces, and the students have become comfortable with each other.



On November 18th and December 2nd the Ivy Book Store will have a “pop-up” shop in the lobby during Religious School hours, 9-12 pm, and the synagogue will receive a portion of the book sales. This is a great way to support our community and check off some friends and family from your Hanukkah gift list. In

addition to your Hanukkah gift list, this is a terrific time to support the Margaret Brent Elementary Middle School, a city school with which we have partnered. With all the tumult around us these days, it can be difficult to find the energy and enthusiasm to serve others. However, this is the mission of our Bolton Street Social Action Committee (SAC): to join with other congregants to make a positive impact on our community – locally, nationally and globally. During the holidays you may have noticed the big Social Action Committee board in the entrance of the Bolton Street Lobby. We are so excited to move into this year with opportunities for action that are flexible in terms of time commitment, age, and abilities.

In mid-September we had our first monthly meeting of the BSS SAC, which included a great presentation from Sharicca Bolden, Community Coordinator for Margaret Brent Elementary Middle School. This community school, located in the heart of Charles Village, serves children and family from more than 40 countries with a wide-range of economic and social needs. Working with Sharicca, we have identified short-term and long-term volunteer options (sign up at: <http://tiny.cc/BSSSAC>) including mural painting, clean up days (outside and inside), and becoming a regular volunteer as a lunch room or library assistant. For volunteers who will be in the school and/or working with the school on an ongoing basis, a background check is required and Sharicca can assist with that process. 
Of immediate need is the revitalization of their library – including a need for new books (hardcover preferred). Sharicca has generated a Bolton Street Amazon book wishlist (<http://a.co/9Y50Ef6>). If you are buying books for someone for the holidays, please consider buying extras for the students at Margaret Brent. Feel free to have books sent directly to the school or bring them to the book bins you will see in the Bolton Street lobby.

In addition to our developing relationship with Margaret Brent, our Bolton Street “Group of 10” continues to meet monthly to advocate for passage of the Kirwan Commission. The Kirwan Commission report has laid out a set of concrete recommendations for improving education in Maryland and its passage is particularly important to Baltimore City students, who have disproportionately suffered from the limited budgets exacerbating economic and racial inequalities. The Group of 10 meets monthly and at each meeting we learn about a specific issue and then write letters to our delegates or the Commissioners. Finally, with the November elections, we hope that everyone voted and made your voice heard. Bolton Street Synagogue is a polling center and with funds from a recent grant, we sponsored a **Party at the Polls** on **November 6**.

We invite you to get involved in activities that are meaningful and can have an impact beyond our own walls. And we look forward to seeing you at one of our monthly meetings.


