

Reflecting, Reframing, and Rebuilding Based on Remarks from the Annual Meeting

We're tired. We're angry. Enough is enough. Time to march in the streets, to make our voice heard. These familiar thoughts were not just uttered in our generation. Even in our Torah, Korach, a rabble rouser, led his 250 followers to revolt against Moses and Aaron. Korach and his followers were upset at the state of their world and furious that there was not equality among the tribes.

And so they stood up, a battle between Moses and Korach using their fire pans to make a sacrifice to God. Unfortunately for Korach, things didn't end so well. The fire he made consumed his 250 men, and the ground burst open swallowing them whole.

If we take a step back and reflect upon this story today, it feels very timely. Not only have many of us spoken up against racism and stood together with Black Lives Matter, but we also have felt that our world is on fire and that our lives have been swallowed whole. We can't be together physically. We've been locked in our homes. Our daily routines have been severely altered, many of us have lost jobs or have lost pay. It's been a very difficult couple of months.

I've been walking this journey alongside all of you. Navigating what it means to be a rabbi, who works remotely out of his home. Trying to figure out how I be a dad and also a teacher to Caleb who just finished 1st grade. How do I be a comforting presence when I'm removed from my community? How do I offer spiritual support, lead moving services, build community, and navigate the complexities of Jewish life solely through Zoom?

My husband Brian says that no one at this moment gets an A+, but if you work hard enough you can get a B. I know that things have not been perfect. But I'm thankful that we have all come together to continue to thrive during this difficult moment. I want to thank Elaine Richman, our president, our Executive Committee and Board, all of our lay

leaders, and our professional staff for your diligence, your devotion, and your hard work. I commend us all for coming together and helping to create a virtual community during this time of challenge.

After Korach and his followers were swallowed into the ground, God shares an interesting command to Moses. "Remove the fire pans – for they have become sacred – and let them be made into hammered sheets as plating for the altar – let them serve as a sign to the people of Israel" (Numbers 17:1-3). I find this reasoning strangely reassuring. The people gathered up the fire pans of Korach and his followers, not to throw them away, but to reuse them, to reframe them for the future. The fire pans were hammered onto the altar – the most sacred place in their community – as a sign for the future.

That I believe is our responsibility moving forward. Our world has been turned upside down. We've been separated from each other, we've been marching in the street, we've woken up to the systematic racism that pervades our society, we've been swallowed whole. Now is the moment that we begin to rebuild and rethink about what is next. We take these past experiences, those things that have been burnt and destroyed, and rehammer them, reframe them for the future. Our goal is to build upon our vision, to reframe the past, and rethink what it means to be a Jewish congregation in Baltimore at this very moment. That means thinking creatively, that means doing things differently, but it also means holding on to our ideals, our culture, and our rituals. It means finding ways to gather together in any way possible – and building a world of kindness, learning, justice, and peace. Let us join together to reflect, to reframe, and to rebuild!

From the President

2020 Annual Meeting Address

What an odd spring we had and summer we're having. The vast majority of us and our families and friends have managed to stay healthy during this amazing, perplexing, once in a lifetime (we surely hope) COVID-19 experience.

As you may already know, two of our Bolton Street Synagogue members were extremely sick with COVID-19. That's Doug Carrey-Beaver and Michael Green. Doug has largely recovered. Mike is still in rehab. I'm sure you all join me in sending them our hopes for a complete recovery.

If you're willing to go along with my anthropomorphizing Bolton Street Synagogue, you'll be very happy to hear that we're in good health and even vigorous. Sure, we very much miss being together in person, holding services, enjoying our onegs together, and more, but we're staying strong, productive, and relevant.

So, I want to show you what I mean by pointing out some of our successes over the past year, since our last Annual Meeting:

We can boast that our religious services have **attracted enviable numbers** of people—when they were in person and now remotely. So have our discussion groups like Torah study, our social events like our Spring Gala or the BOLT meet-ups. The same is true for our social justice initiatives related to our BUILD partnerships, and much more.

We **increased our profile in the community** around LGBTQ issues, inclusivity, support of city-wide educational improvements, and anti-racism. On June 3, for example, Rabbi Gordon addressed a rally for justice, healing, and peace. This was by invitation from Saint Vincent de Paul Church in downtown Baltimore and the Baltimore Jewish Council. Everywhere I go people know about Bolton Street Synagogue and marvel at our relevance and growth.

In the past year we also **engaged more with the larger community**. We collected electronic hardware for city school students, conducted a food drive, and delivered casseroles in our long-term commitment to Our Daily Bread. Several of our BSS leaders, including Rabbi Gordon, now serve on local and national boards where important decisions are made that affect the well-being of the Jewish and larger community.

Our **Social Action Committee** is charging ahead to understand and make an impact on anti-racism. To start, the Committee will be hosting a conversation based on a book called *White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism*, by Robin DiAngelo.

We are growing the responsibilities of our **Membership Engagement Committee** and **Care Committee**. We've introduced a **60+ group** that meets virtually every two weeks for people of a certain age. At the other end of the spectrum, Rabbi Gordon leads new **Tot Shabbat events** and **family programming**.

We have received **government funding** to improve the safety of our building. We've expertly drawn up plans—thanks to our **Security Committee**—to ensure the safety of our congregants.

Our **religious school** grew to its highest numbers in years and we saw our older students take on significant responsibility in the classroom and for relationship building.

We said goodbye to our beloved religious school director **Jillian Manko** and are about to welcome—on July 1—**Cory Hermann** as our new and very talented religious school leader.

As our outgoing **treasurer, Nancy Hutton**, is about to report, we feel confident that our bills will be paid despite a possible downturn in revenues in the coming year related to COVID-19.

We're working on plans for **safely reopening**, when the time is right. We're also keeping up on building maintenance and beautifying our grounds during this quiet period. As for the **grounds**, please swing by to see how lovely our property looks. Sit for a while in the Commemorative Garden if you'd like or stroll through our new native garden to the west of the upper parking lot.

We're **updated our bylaws**, purchased new Shabbat and High Holiday **prayerbooks**, and today are presenting to you a slate of new board members to take the place of the wonderful people who are rotating off.

Finally, I want to mention the **Religious Culture Committee**. Some of you attended a meeting last night to help the Committee envision our High Holy Day celebrations in the light of COVID-19. Across the globe, synagogues are preparing for a new kind of service: perhaps with some parts in person and others via Zoom or through streaming from the homes of Torah readers. It won't be the same, that's for sure, but I have every confidence that it'll be memorable and great because that is what we do at Bolton Street Synagogue.

We will go forward in big and little ways, as we always do. I miss you all. I would love to be together and we will be when the time is right.

Thank you again for being here tonight, for being a member of the Bolton Street community, and for giving me the honor of being your President. Thank you, too, to the Bolton Street Synagogue staff for all the important work they do and to our volunteers for all their amazing work. Thank you to the Bolton Street Synagogue Board of Trustees for helping steer the direction of our community, and thank you Rabbi Gordon for being the exactly right spiritual leader for us.

Hello! I am thrilled to be joining the Bolton Street Synagogue Community as the new Director of Education. I am looking forward to meeting many of you over the next month or two as we get ready to launch a new school year.

Let me share a little bit about myself. I grew up in New York, just outside of New York City. My family was very active in our Reform synagogue as I was growing up. It was that involvement that really informed and formed my love of Judaism and connection to the Jewish people. Whether it was my parents volunteering in synagogue activities and leadership, my extended family celebrating holidays and festivals, attending religious school through Confirmation, or my involvement in youth group and NFTY, including serving on the regional board, all had a great impact on who I am today and the choices I make in my life.

After pursuing my Bachelor's degree in education from the University of Delaware, I began my professional career in formal and informal Jewish Education. I continued that work after receiving my Master's degree in social work and have been working in the field of Jewish education in some capacity for the past 29 years. I have worked in a variety of settings including synagogues in NY, NJ, and Baltimore, camp, teen post b'nai mitzvah programs and JCC early learning centers and outreach programs. These experiences have given me the opportunity to work with all kinds of families, in all different stages in their own Jewish journeys. Social Action Committee News

Soon after the murder of George Floyd, the Social Action Committee (SAC) met to discuss our response to this senseless death.

We shared our feelings which ranged from outrage, despair, hopelessness, and sadness, to guilt. For some, this event unmasked the trauma of being arrested and beaten just for being Black, and feeling overwhelmed that humanity no longer exists for Black people. Listening to people of color was powerful and deeply meaningful. Members asked why so much hate exists in our country. Why do we consider ourselves good-intentioned people who are anti-racist, but at the same time we live in a society that has deep racial inequities?

The COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted how centuries of systemic racism has caused people of color to have a disproportionate number of deaths from the virus, inadequate testing availability, and not enough electronic devices or WiFi access for quality in-home schooling.

We discussed that our country is at a crossroads and the national spotlight on institutional racism has created an opportunity for BSS to join in this movement.

What can we do?

1. We should have honest and reflective conversations about racism, among ourselves, our community and our congregation. As Rabbi Abraham Joshua Hershel says, "Few are guilty, but all are responsible." It is time to work on dismantling racism rather than letting it continue to exist.
2. We need to continue working with BUILD, Jews United for Justice (JUFJ), and Strong Schools Maryland. In addition, we should connect with NAACP, Baltimore Racial Justice Action, the Poor People's Campaign and other local groups. The Reform Action Center (RAC) can provide guidance and resources as well.
3. The police structure needs to be reexamined. Why is there a disproportionate use of force, arrests and death against people of color?

As a first step, the SAC is scheduling a facilitated book discussion based on *White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk about Racism*, by Robin DiAngelo. The author looks at assumptions that perpetuate racist beliefs without us realizing it. To reserve a book contact Lauren Kelleher at lauren.joyce.kelleher@gmail.com. The social justice work we have been doing for the last few years will continue, but through the conscious lens of racial equality.

Bolton Street Synagogue has been a member of Strong Schools Maryland since August 2017. Strong Schools Maryland's initial goal was to ensure that the recommendations of the Kirwan Commission became law. This would create a world-class education system for every student, especially those who are disproportionately affected by issues of race, poverty, language, and disability. Working as a Group of Ten within Strong Schools Maryland, Bolton Street members have advocated by letter, email, phone call, and in person, both in Baltimore and Annapolis

Governor Hogan vetoed the bill that was passed in both the House and the Senate. They plan to vote to override his veto when they are back in session. At this time, there are no known plans for a special session so this probably will not happen until January 2021 at the earliest. We will keep the community informed about any actions to be taken.

As a member of BUILD, we assembled packages for the distribution of food and PPE's to over 500 families in need. BUILD is organizing to expand testing sites into communities across Baltimore and to ensure equitable access to public health care as well as addressing long standing health inequities.


