FROM RABBI GORDON



AVINU MALKENU HEAR OUR VOICE

Each of us has those moments when the High Holy Days truly come alive. Of course, there is the blast of the shofar, the singing of Kol Nidre, and the magnificent cantorial pieces of the morning service. For me, it is the Avinu Malkenu that provides shivers down my spine. I appreciate the folk melody where we all join-in together, but I am moved by the longer version written by Cantor Max Janowski, which Cantorial Soloist Rachel Graber will sing throughout Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. It is uplifting and beautiful. For me, it is the highlight of the Holy Days.

Avinu Malkenu is a very old prayer. Its origins are a short petition written by Rabbi Akiva almost 2,000 years ago during the time of a great drought. "Avinu Malkenu, we have no king, but you. Avinu Malkenu, have compassion upon us." Over time, more and more versions of petition were written by our ancestors. They asked for mercy, compassion, and forgiveness. They beseeched God to hear their voices, to listen to their prayers.

Now, I know there are a lot of theological challenges with this prayer, especially to modern liberal Jews. Avinu Malkenu literally means, "Our Father, Our King." This prayer can be troubling to those who do not wish to gender God or who wish not to see God as a masculine entity. And, there are plenty of us who are challenged by prayers of petition or even about belief in God!

However, there is also something comforting in reciting a prayer that has been a part of our tradition for thousands of years. There is a connection to those who came before us and to those Jews who stood each year on these Holy Days reciting the same words as we do today.

In addition, the generations who came before us also lived during difficult times. Whether droughts, storms, violence, pandemic, or discrimination, they too hoped for a better year ahead. So, too, do we follow in their footsteps and pray that 5782 will be a

better year than 5781. And so, these are my prayers for the New Year:

Avinu Malkenu, hear our voice.

Avinu Malkenu, may the New Year be a good year for us.

Avinu Malkenu, may humanity come together to defeat this pandemic.

Avinu Malkenu, may hatred and divisiveness be turned to love and gentleness.

Avinu Malkenu, may humanity battle to save our planet.

Avinu Malkenu, may we be able to live freely and openly as Jews.

Avinu Malkenu, may all in our world be treated with compassion and kindness.

Avinu Malkenu, hear our voice.







MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

When I assumed the presidency in June, I expected that we would be squarely addressing post-pandemic issues, considering how to ensure equitable participation in services, meetings and activities for those who could not join in-person at our fully reopened synagogue. Here we are, however, on the brink of the High Holy Day season (and in the midst of it as you read this), with continuing restrictions on the number of congregants who may attend in-person services, mask requirements inside and outside, and the specter of the Delta variant of the coronavirus ever-present in our lives. I take comfort from knowing that our COVID committee has guided us with wisdom and with the safety and health of our community at heart.

As those of you who heard or read my installation talk and saw my membership letter will gather by now, community is a recurring theme for me. When I was young, I did not understand why I had to atone for sins I had not committed during the congregational recitation of the Vidui. Many years later, I understand that we atone as a community because we take responsibility for each other. As a Board member and now as President, I have watched our leaders put their own preferences aside to focus on the welfare of our community as a whole during the pandemic, and I know that we are abiding, not only in accord with the value of preserving life, but in accord with the value of inclusion. Our upgraded technology will improve access to services and events for those Zooming in from home, and our Owl technology will make hybrid meetings possible. Our goal is to make every member of our community welcome and able to participate in synagogue life.

Our community will celebrate its 36th anniversary next year. You will hear more about that over the coming months. But I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge another anniversary, one that occurred

this year. Five years ago, in 2016, Bolton Street Synagogue affiliated with the Union of Reform Judaism and became a Reform synagogue. Over these five years, this affiliation has brought us our beloved Rabbi, resources and opportunities for our youth, leadership opportunities, and guidance and information, among other benefits. But it has also brought the intangible feeling that comes from being part of a larger whole. I remember how many of us felt after hearing Rabbi Jonah Pesner speak about social justice—suddenly, we realized that the work of Tikkun Olam did not rest on our shoulders alone, and we could join the robust work of the Religious Action Committee. It was like finding a home we had not known existed. We found in the Audacious Hospitality work of the URJ the principles that so closely aligned with our values and our mission. We found in the prayer book what many had been searching for or had not known they needed to find. Affiliation has helped us find our place in the larger Jewish community in Baltimore, in the United States, and in the world.

Over the coming months, despite our pandemic fatigue, we must continue to push forward and focus on the needs of our community as a whole. I wish all of you a healthy and happy New Year, and I wish all of us the wisdom, the patience, the flexibility, and the fortitude to allow each other our inevitable missteps, to celebrate our joys and comfort each other in our sorrows, and, above all, to strengthen the ties that bind us together as a community. L'shana Tova.

SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE NEWS

SAC members have had an active summer despite the ongoing COVID pandemic. Our SAC member, Sean Johnson, who is also a Justice Leader Fellow with the Institute for Islamic Christian Jewish Studies (ICJS) wrote for a recent ICJS Justice Fellows Blog on economic empowerment with a particular focus on American descendants of enslaved persons.

In mid-July, **BUILD** held its first in-person, city-wide leadership meeting since the pandemic began. Over 125 leaders gathered outside at Steuart Hill Academic Academy on a beautiful evening to hear reports on BUILD's work over the past year and to think about how to move forward. We celebrated the tremendous efforts of BUILD in getting food to people during this past year and a half, in arranging COVID testing and COVID vaccines, and in developing affordable housing. We also continued the conversation about how to use the enormous pot of federal money that will be coming into Baltimore. BUILD wants to be sure that the city's residents speak up about priorities for those dollars. On **Saturday, September 18 at 1:00 pm** BUILD will hold an action with Mayor Scott to talk about that funding. Bolton Street has committed to bringing 30 people — so please mark your calendar and keep an eye out for details! For more information about BUILD, contact Melissa at Melissa.zieve@gmail.com.

We have also continued to work as part of the leadership of the **BLM Interfaith Coalition**. The Coalition will be holding a virtual meeting for the 35 member organizations on **Thursday**, **September 9 at 7:00 pm** to discuss our proposed mission statement and goals and ask for feedback. The Coalition will also be restarting the BLM rallies with the next one **on Sunday**, **September 19th at 1:30 pm**; the place will be decided soon and details will follow. We have also continued to be involved in the **Voting Rights** work. Carol Goldstein has been representing the SAC with the **For the People – Maryland** group which has been involved in advocating for the John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act (<u>H.R.4</u>) and the For the People Act (<u>H.R.1/S.1</u>). The current state of play for the passage of HR 1 is to request that constituents call Senator Cardin and Van Hollen to advocate that they fix the filibuster in order to assist in its passage. Re-Imagining High Holiday Liturgy: Where Do We Begin?"

Our study will explore the historical perspective of the Vidui (the Confessional portion of the service), Avenu Malkeinu, and Unetaneh Tokef. Together, we will discuss how to personalize these "cornerstone" prayers to create a dynamic worship experience. This session is a teaser for the upcoming Adult Education series, "Daring to Daven." We look forward to beginning the dialogue exploring a more meaningful spiritual experience during the Day of Atonement.



Daring to Daven An Innovative Exploration of Liturgy and Ritual

Have you ever sat through services wondering what the meaning and relevance was of the prayers you were reciting? Have you had milestones in your life that you wanted to mark with a Jewish ritual but lacked the insight to create one that worked for the occasion?

Introducing "Daring to Daven," Bolton Street Synagogue's newest Adult Education opportunity. Together, we will make prayer come alive through the creation of modern liturgical blessings as well as new rituals that can deeply impact our Bolton Street Synagogue community. The class will discuss liturgy that challenges us with the aim of understanding both the theological framework and the historical aspects of the prayers. We will strengthen our relationships with other congregants through chavruta study and large group learning.

The full group will meet on Sundays (see dates and times below) with Rabbi Andy Gordon to discuss a prayer, liturgical moment, or lifecycle ceremony. Participants will work in pairs with a chavruta partner to further their study and to create their own modern liturgy. Chavruta will meet on Sunday mornings or at another time that works for their study. We will meet to share and discuss how we accessed, adapted, rewrote, or created new prayerful moments.

Curious about how this will work? Join us for a study session on Yom Kippur afternoon, at 2:30 pm, where we will discuss some of the most challenging High Holy Day prayers.

This series will be held from 10:00 -11:00 am on two Sundays each month beginning October 3, and going through May. 
