FROM RABBI GORDON



GRAPPLING, QUESTIONING, ENGAGING, AND CONNECTING WITH ISRAEL

Over the last few months, our congregation has focused much of our adult, teen, and family programming around our relationship with Israel. We know that our connection to Israel is deeply personal, multifaceted, and complex!

As a congregation, we believe that it is important to grapple with Israel. We want to hear our various viewpoints, to question, and to engage deeply with the people and State of Israel.

This year, Bolton Street Synagogue was thrilled to receive a grant from the Jacob & Hilda Blaustein Fund for the Enrichment of Jewish Education of the Associated: Jewish Community Federation of Baltimore. Thanks to the hard work by Cory Hermann, our Director of Education, as part of the grant, we were able to develop a year long relationship with Uri Feinberg, Master Jewish Educator and Israel Guide. Over the last 25 years, Uri has taught Jewish History, guided trips to Israel, and connected with young and old. He is passionate about Israel and has a clear desire to allow for robust conversation, to strengthen Jewish identity, and to build bridges between Israel and the United States.

We are thrilled that Uri will be joining us in-person as our Scholar-in-Residence from March 15 - 22. As part of the Blaustein grant, Uri will be teaching adults, teens, and families about Israel history, having conversations

around identity and diving into the tough questions! It is a true gift to have Uri with us for an entire week, and I invite you whole heartedly to attend one, if not more, of the sessions while he is here in Baltimore. Please look out for a BSS mailing, as well as more information in the Chaverim about all of the programs that will be in-person and on Zoom.

Finally, it has been seven years since Bolton Street
Synagogue travelled to Israel on a congregational trip.
We are excited about the possibilities of traveling to
Israel together in December 2023. This will be a multigenerational trip that will be open to families, singles, and
couples of all ages. The hope is that both Cory Hermann
and I, along with Uri Feinberg as our guide, will allow for
a meaningful experience to Israel for all ages and to
strengthen our relationship with Israel and each other.
Please join us on Sunday, March 20th at 9:00 am to hear
more about the trip and to let us know of your interest.

May we as a congregation continue to learn, to question, to grapple, and to engage with Israel in the year ahead!

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Three friends (two from Bolton Street Synagogue) and I are slowly—very slowly—reading and discussing Marcel Proust's, In Search of Lost Time, a six-volume masterpiece that concerns itself to a great extent with how our minds form and assimilate our experiences into memories, while also addressing issues of class, anti-Semitism, and social relationships. Because of this immersive endeavor, I find myself having many "Proustian" experiences these days; something I see or smell or hear sparks a memory or chain of memories. This happened recently when our daughter, Rebecca, in preparation for teaching her Hebrew school class about Sephardic music, ordered a copy of "The Hidden Gate," a collection of Sephardic and Eastern European diaspora music that we often listened to when she was young. I located our copy, and as soon as I heard the first song, I was flooded with memories of the conversations and music we shared during our daily commute to and from school. As we listened to the CD, we would marvel again and again that Jews ended up in India, Greece, Zimbabwe and so many other countries whose music is included on the CD. But I also vividly remembered the unique Bat Mitzvah ceremony we designed for Pazya, our daughter with disabilities, when we used one of the songs from the CD, "Primavera en Salonico" (Springtime in Salonika), as part of a service filled with music about spring to honor Paz's middle name, Aviva, which means "springtime" or "life." Paz did not enter the adult Bolton Street Synagogue community in a traditional way, but her service was memorable for all who were present that day.

I did not know when I bought the CD, or when Rebecca and I listened to it, or that this music would create such vibrant and lasting memories, or that some of those memories would be tied to Bolton Street Synagogue. It is often, I think, in the casual, the unanticipated, or the unexpected that some of our deepest connections and memories may be created. It is that process that Proust describes so well. And it is in being thoughtful about how we create the framework for that process to occur that we strive to make Bolton Street Synagogue a community where all who come through our doors, literally or figuratively, can participate in activities and nurture relationships that will build memories.

As we celebrate our 36th anniversary, I ask all of you to share your memories of Bolton Street Synagogue. Whether you have been part of our community for a long or short time, what do you remember most when you think of BSS? What do you hope to weave into your memories of BSS when you look back in a year? Five years? Ten years? I encourage you to share your memories and wishes as we look backwards and forwards. And, as always, please feel free to reach out if you have questions or want to chat.

A LOOK BACK AT BOLTON STREET

I'm a second-generation member; my parents joined Bolton Street Synagogue before I was born. Because I was so young, I was largely oblivious to the monumental effort needed to create a warm, inviting Jewish home. To me, my Jewish upbringing seemed unremarkable – I assumed everyone had the same experience.

1311 Bolton Street, the first permanent address, was ours and we filled it with love and community, but rarely with heat or air-conditioning (the sanctuary's vaulted ceilings made that impractical). We experienced Baltimore's fickle weather: loosening ties and waving fans at a late summer Rosh Hashanah service – the room packed with daveners – or huddled in parkas to celebrate Hanukkah, the menorah's candlelight keeping us warm.

I revered the titans of our congregation, people like Eddie Young and Mike Zabner. Eddie, self-described as delightfully cantankerous, embodied the spirit of Bolton Street Synagogue, irreverent and kind-hearted. Mike ran High Holy Days as much as any of our clergy. An eggshell button-down shirt, sleeves rolled and tie loosened, Mike directed traffic in the sanctuary. With one aisle and nowhere to hide, Mike helped everyone find their seats. Dare to be late and risk being marched to the front row, exposed before the whole congregation. But Mike's pièce de resistance was the Annual Meeting. He transformed a low-key affair into the highlight of the summer. After a formal vote on the slate of Board officers, Mike presided at the nearby Bolton Hill Swim and Tennis Club, where he lavished members with small gifts he had purchased as we all enjoyed a potluck picnic.

Bolton Street Synagogue was a do-it-yourself community, and that made us different and democratic. Come for Shabbat and you were likely to leave as a member of a committee (some things don't change). Everyone pitched in – Sharon Krevor-Weisbaum, an attorney, led the children's services at High Holy Days, Gary Felser, a cabinet maker, was Mr. Fix It, and Steve Snyder, a college professor, led Shabbat services.

Our religious school could assemble all of its students and teachers on the four marble steps that led to our front doors. Just inside the front doors, the coat closet played the unusual dual role of foyer and social hall. When it got too social, we would be admonished from the bema, the scene spilling onto the front brick patio.

After our first years in religious school, we graduated from the basement to the sanctuary where we found makeshift classrooms separated by moveable partitions. We huddled, straining to hear the teachers over the din of the other lectures. We really made it when, in Hay class, we upgraded to the rabbi's study, a windowless room behind the bema so narrow the chairs were arranged single file. When a teacher asked for a book, I slipped down the steep, narrow back staircase to the steel library cart next to the emergency exit that served as our library.

It was fitting that my Bar Mitzvah was held within those hallowed walls, the place that represented so much of my childhood ushering me into adulthood. I studied hard, memorizing cassette tapes prepared by my tutor, Norman Ament. My preparation amused our rabbi, Mona Decker, for Norman's thick Baltimore drawl had rubbed off on my Hebrew pronunciation. When the fateful day arrived, I melodramatically intoned my Haftarah in tribute to Cantor Alan Rubenstein, whose tenor could be heard throughout Midtown. As I concluded, Rabbi Decker reached for the catcher's mask she had hidden for just this occasion – to protect herself from candy flung by teenage boys.

It wasn't until I started attending my friends' Bar Mitzvahs at other synagogues that I realized how special my childhood was, though they might have had more ornate sanctuaries, separate social halls, or off-street parking. When I met my future wife, who attended a megasynagogue in Philadelphia, I was eager to show her Bolton Street. For though the address has changed and we welcome new members every year, Bolton Street Synagogue remains the warm, inviting Jewish home in which I grew up. And that's what makes it remarkable.
