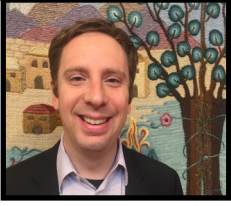

MARKING THE BIG 3-6

As I'm sure many of you have heard, we're celebrating a milestone this year, our big 36th Anniversary! Each letter of our Hebrew Alphabet has a corresponding number. The letters Chet and Yud (for eight and ten) together make-up the Hebrew word Chai, meaning life. That is why our Jewish tradition has heavily favored giving gifts of 18, or in this case, double-chai – 36! What better way to celebrate our life as a congregation than by marking this moment of 36 years since our founding.

In this issue of the Chaverim and in the weeks ahead, you'll hear plenty about our upcoming 36th Anniversary events including: our Casino Night Fundraiser, our celebration of founding members and past presidents, and honoring all those who have been involved in our religious school. It's fitting that we take time to look backwards from our founding till today to celebrate those who shepherded us to this moment. Please join us for many of these events as we gather to honor, thank, and bless all in our community who helped make us who we are today!

But even more so, we need to look forward. At special gatherings we clink our glasses and say, l'chaim, to life! We look forward to life ahead: to the journeys, the milestones, and the simchas. As a congregation, we want to mark this thirty-sixth anniversary as a time to look towards our future.

We pride ourselves on being a warm and welcoming Jewish home; even our tagline is "Doors Wide Open." Yet, we know that through this pandemic it has been much more difficult to foster and strengthen relationships. As part of my Clergy Leadership Incubator (CLI) Fellowship, I was tasked

to reflect upon a challenge in our congregation. Alongside a wonderful team of lay leaders: Marc Wernick, Ben Wilson, Dinah Winnick, Melissa Zieve, and our Administrator, Monica Blum, we are launching a new project that will help strengthen relationships and further connect our members to our congregation and Jewish life. We are calling this the Gesher Bridges Project.

Bolton Street Synagogue's Gesher Bridges Project works to grow connections among synagogue members and boost their sense of community belonging. A group of volunteer Bridge Builders reaches out to new members, and members who aren't yet regularly connected with the community, to learn about their interests and perspectives and connect them with BSS groups, activities, congregants, and resources.

Our dream is to bring aboard 15 Bridge Builders who will strengthen relationships, find ways to connect members to our community, and help bring about new small group gatherings. You will hear plenty about the Gesher Bridges Project in the weeks and months ahead. We are planning a formal launch this summer with new opportunities to meet congregants, develop relationships, and create new ways to engage in your Jewish community.

And we need your help! If you are interested in becoming a Bridge Builder (or want to learn more) please reach out to me. We pray that on this, our thirty-sixth anniversary, we continue to live and grow as a vibrant Jewish community where everyone feels known, cared for, and honored for their gifts. Amen.



MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

On April 14, 2022, Jeffrey Gettleman, an international correspondent for the New York Times, wrote a powerful article titled, “On Poland-Ukraine Border, the Past is Always Present. It’s Not Always Predictive.” (<https://www.nytimes.com/2022/04/14/world/europe/poland-ukraine-holocaust-dispatch.html>). Gettleman, a Jewish reporter with family roots in Eastern Europe, wrestles with the task of reconciling Ukraine’s troubling Holocaust-drenched past with its present. Many of us have been engaged in this same effort. It is not possible to, nor should we, Gettleman contends, disregard the atrocities that took place on Ukrainian soil. At the same time, however, much has changed, and we look with anguish at the headlines and news alerts that bombard us with images and updates about the war as we absorb the incongruity that this place which harbors so much collective trauma for us as Jews now is headed by a Jewish president fighting for the sovereignty of his people. In addressing this issue, Gettleman quotes the author Daniel Mendelsohn, who talks about the importance of updating our beliefs, recognizing that the world changes. Gettleman concludes: “We shouldn’t forget what happened and, for some of us, even distantly connected to the events of the past, we simply can’t. But the Ukraine of today and the Poland of today are not the Ukraine or Poland of the Holocaust. And perhaps that’s one of the greatest lessons of this awful war. Countries are living things that grow and change. They are shaped by their past but not chained to it, just like us.”

I found this commentary helpful; I like the idea of a country as a living thing that grows and changes, as an entity capable of a collective “teshuvah”—of repentance—of sorts. Although many of us have come to view Germany very differently over the years because of its very public process of taking responsibility for its past, I had not made that shift for other countries, such as Ukraine, the place from which some of Russ’ relatives emigrated and whose experiences were so unpleasant that his uncle, for one, vowed never to return for any reason. Making this shift allows us to move past the history of Ukraine and recognize our fellow humans—Jews and non-Jews—who are living in unimaginable circumstances, and those who

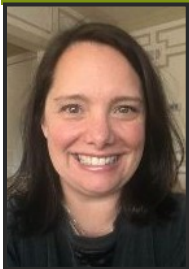
have fled, often leaving spouses, parents or children behind, and who are in need of support and services.

As I write this, we have just concluded our celebration of Passover, commemorating our time in Egypt as slaves. Pandemic restrictions are lifting, and we are feeling a sense of freedom as we enjoy spring and prepare to celebrate Bolton Street’s 36th Anniversary. But just as we break a wine glass at weddings to remember the destruction of the Temples, we should temper our happiness now by remembering those across the miles who are hungry, hiding, and trying to survive while fighting for their freedom. As we continue to explore how we as a synagogue can best fit into efforts to assist, you may wish to connect with The Associated (associated.org/Ukraine) or with HIAS (act.hias.org), both of whom have created special funds to assist Ukrainians.

Thanks to all of you for the work you do to make our world a better place.

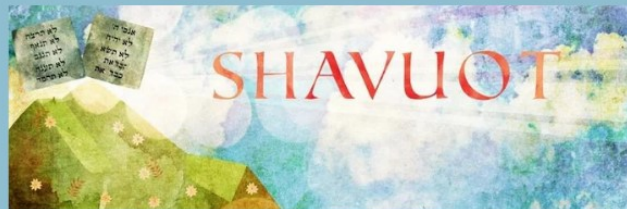
